And finally

I'd like to share with you the commentary by Rev. Peter Moger on Monday morning's bible reading of Revelation chapter 5 (why not read it before you go any further). I quote from the commentary: "It's easy to forget that when we gather for worship, we always share in something far greater than the visible gathering of those assembled.... Whenever worship is offered, it has an eternal dimension, as our prayers and praises join with those offered continually around God's throne. Some see in the earthly sanctuary a replication of the heavenly: the Eucharist as a foretaste of the marriage supper of the Lamb. Our worship, though, is often a poor echo of its heavenly counterpart, and this has little to do with the number present. Revelation 4 and 5 remind us that the Church's triumphant primary activity is worship, and that at worship's centre is the Lamb upon the throne. Is that always true of the Church on earth – or is our worship sometimes more a means to an end (evangelism or fellowship, perhaps) and is Christ always at its centre? If it were so, we might then catch a glimpse of those saints and angels." Food for thought there!

Let us pray: "Almighty Father, whose will is to restore all things in your beloved Son, the King of all: govern the hearts and minds of those in authority and bring the families of the nations, divided and torn apart by the ravages of sin, to be subject to his just and gentle rule; who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen."
